Issues to think about now



Think Pieces are concise opinion pieces which aim to add to the wider dialogue on issues facing New Zealand. While our reports often have a long-term focus, we believe it is also important to engage with these issues in the short-term as well.

Over the past few months, we have published five of these Think Pieces: Weak Signals and Wild Cards, a discussion of insights Wendy had while at the recent World Future Conference in Washington D.C.; Hard Work, which looked at what pressures changing demographics and technology are placing on our work force; While AgResearch Fiddled, an opinion piece which looks at the decisions our Crown Research Institutes are making about what path New Zealand should take to solve problems of agricultural emissions; What is a National Sustainable Development Strategy?, an overview to accompany the publication of our government reports and our most recent, Magnifying Hope and Reducing Fear, which outlines our recommendations for the new government. PROJECT 2058 Looking towards a sustainable New Zealand



Project 2058 is an ambitious exploration of New Zealand's future, which is aimed at producing a National Sustainable Development Strategy. Initially, we thought that this would be a two-year project, however, we now realise that it will in fact stretch into 2009. This will ensure that the strategy we offer to New Zealand is the most definitive and relevant that we can provide. Reports 4 and 5: The completion of the New Zealand Government Reports

The recent publication of our Reports 4, 4a and 5 sees the completion of the section of Project 2058 we refer to as the 'New Zealand Government Reports'. Over the past few months, these reports have been read by staff at the United Nations and reviewed by external reviewers. The result is a thorough evaluation of the current status of New Zealand's institutional framework for supporting sustainable development, and how it measures up against international progress. Reports in Progress: Project Genetic Modification


Following the publication of our two reports earlier this year, we continue to assess New Zealand's management of genetic modification. Subsequent to the finalisation of the proposed changes to HSNO (Methodology) Order 1998, we intend releasing our third report in this series, The Future of Genetic Modification in New Zealand. This report will build on our recent submissions to ERMA, including our response to the changes of the Methodology and the suite of transgenic animal applications made by AgResearch. Our recent Think Piece 6, While AgResearch Fiddled also outlines our concerns about the strategic direction of our Crown Research Institutes.
