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A backwards glance: New Zealand's GM history revisited

In order to consider the next steps forward for genetic modification in New Zealand, it is vital to look at the history of the issue, says Sustainable Future in its just released report, The History of Genetic Modification in New Zealand.

"The paper is a chance to reflect on the history of genetic modification in this country, in order to consider the next steps regarding policy and practice in what has been one of the more complex and publicly engaging debates of the last ten years," says Sustainable Future's Chief Executive, Wendy McGuinness.

She says the paper provides a useful background for policy-makers and members of the wider community who are interested in exploring ways of tackling the diverse social, cultural, economic and environmental impacts of genetic modification.
